SNA Sports Coach of the Year



Ferris State Matches Division II Win Record (38), Captures 2018 National Championship

SIOUX FALLS, S.D. — Ferris State University capped off a historic campaign as the Bulldogs claimed the school's first NCAA Division II national championship with a 71-69 win over Northern State (S.D.) before a sold out crowd inside the Sanford Pentagon on Saturday.

The Bulldogs won the championship title and also matched the all-time NCAA Division II record with their 38th win of the year, tying Winona State (Minn.) for the most victories in a singlecampaign in Division II basketball history.

Ferris State finished with a 38-1 overall record and won its last 26 games in a row to close the year.

The Bulldogs fell behind early by seven points in the opening half, but rallied back to take a 39-37 halftime lead. The second half went back

and forth with FSU grabbing a six-point advantage with 18:12 to go in the game before the Wolves responded in the second-ever series matchup.

Down the stretch, the two teams traded advantages before the Bulldogs finally surged in front in the closing throws while making threeof-eight (37.5%) three's in the triumph.

Northern State, which closed the year with a 36-4 mark, was led by Carter Evans' game-high 20 points.

The Bulldogs were outrebounded 33-27 for the day.



minute. A last-second try from Northern State fell short and the Bulldogs secured the rebound to pull out the victory.

Junior center Zach Hankins led the way for FSU with a team-high 19 points while earning NCAA Division II Elite Eight Most Oustanding Player honors.

The Bulldogs also got 12 points from senior wing Peter Firlik.

Overall, Ferris State shot 47.3 percent for the day and hit 16-of-22 (72.7%) free Ferris State became only the second Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) school ever to win a national championship in men's basketball, joining Findlay's unbeaten 2009 team in the record books. FSU also matched Winona State's alltime wins record with their 38th triumph of the year.

The national championship is the first one ever for a Ferris State University athletics squad in NCAA Division II competition.

Our Player of the Year is Zach Hankins of Ferris State. He had an incredible junior year and led his team to a national title.


Our corporate partners provided strong support this season. SNA Sports and Molten showed their commitments to Division II coaches.



Ferris State junior center Zach Hankins has been named the 2018 *Division II Bulletin* Player of the Year.

Hankins helped lead the Bulldogs to a second consecutive Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) regular-season championship, a fourth-straight league tournament title, the school's second-ever regional crown and a national championship.

Hankins has paced the Bulldogs in scoring (14.9) and rebounding (9.9) while also leading the conference in rebounding, field goal percentage and blocked shots. He compiled 31 double-figure scoring efforts for the Bulldogs and ranked among the national leaders in several statistical categories. The standout center also was tabbed as the GLIAC Player of the Year for the second year in a row and was the Elite Eight Most Outstanding Player recipient.

Hankins headlines the *DIIB* All-Americans, where he is joined on the first team by Justin Pitts from Northwest Missouri, Daeshon Francis of UT Permian Basin, Justin Reyes of St. Thomas Aquinas and David Chavlovich from West Texas A&M.

Division II Bulletin has named a Player of the Year every year since the 1991-92 season.

Ferris State University head coach Andy Bronkema has been named the 2018 SNA Sports/*Division II Bulletin* Coach of the Year.
