NORTHWEST MISSOURI STATE: It's a difficult task but the Bearcats (35-1 record last season) would love to be the first NCAA Division 2 program to win back-to-back national championships since Cal State Bakersfield pulled off the feat in 1993 and '94. That achievement could very well come to pass with the return of 5-9 All-America speedster Justin Pitts, who slashed his way to 20.9 points and 5.1 assists per game last year. Coach Ben McCollum has plenty more fireworks in reserve with 6-7 starting forwards Chris-Ebou Ndow (12.5 ppg, 6.7 rpg) and Brett Dougherty back.

queens (N.C.): The Royals (30-4) reached the NCAA Sweet 16 last year and look poised to improve on that. The four senior starters returning are 6-3 Jalin Alexander (13.3 ppg), 6-8 Todd Withers (13.6 ppg, 7.0 rpg), 6-4 Mike Davis (13.4 ppg) and 5-11 Ike Agusi (10.7 ppg, 4.5 apg). Coach Bart Lundy also welcomes back eight reserves, led by 6-2 Darryl White, 6-0 Daniel Carr and 6-4 Josh Van Weezep, a trio that combined to average 15.5 points last year. The 87.3 point-per-game offense will get a charge from 6-7 juco transfers Lewis Diankulu and DeVarte Watson.

INDIANA (PA.): Four starters and three lettermen brighten the outlook for the Crimson Hawks (28-4), who lost to national runner-up Fairmont State in the Sweet 16.

Coach Joe Lombardi's defense-minded team (68.2 ppg) brings back four starters: 6-9 Jacobo Diaz (14.4 ppg, 10.0 rpg), 6-0 Dante Lombardi (13.5 ppg, 5.5 apg), 6-1 Anthony Glover (13.6 ppg) and 6-3 Ayron Hutton. Help off the bench comes from 6-7 Blake Danielak and 6-4 Malik Miller. Two 6-8 transfers, Anthony White (Siena) and Dom Keyes (Harford CC), add size.

BELLARMINE: Balance, depth and defense (65.3 ppg) are major assets for the Knights (32-4), who are coming off their fourth Final Four in the last seven years. Coach Scott Davenport returns only two starters in 6-8 Adam Eberhard (17.0 ppg, 7.6 rpg) and 6-2 Tyler Jenkins (8.3 ppg), but the cupboard is far from empty with nine other lettermen back. Those players include 6-1 Brent Bach, 6-1 Jarek Coles, 6-6 Alex Cook and 6-7 Ben Weyer. Division 1 transfer Parker Chitty, a 6-2 guard from Eastern Kentucky, provides instant help.

BARRY: The Bucs (23-7) are quite the international team, with players from eight different countries. No matter what the nationality, though, all eight guys can play. Coach Butch Estes returns three starters in 6-0

All-America guard Elvar Fridriksson (17.4 ppg, 4.3 rpg, 7.7 apg) and 6-8 forwards Daniel Mortensen (11.1 ppg, 6.2 rpg) and Kenan Guzonjic. The top reserve back is 6-4 Sawyer Glick (10.9 ppg). Two D1 transfers—6-9 Johannes Dolven (Drake) and 6-6 Kyle Carey (Northern Colorado)—provide an immediate boost.

LINCOLN MEMORIAL: The Railsplitters (30-6) are looking to return to the Final Four for the third straight year. Coach Josh Schertz's balanced attack is led by four returning starters—6-5 Dorian Pinson (12.5 ppg, 8.1 rpg), 6-2 Trevon Shaw (11.4 ppg), 6-0 Cornelius Taylor (10.7) and 6-9 Emanuel Terry (10.1), plus top reserve Deshawn Patterson.

TEXAS-PERMIAN BASIN: The Falcons (26-6) have seven of their top eight scorers back from a team that was the school's first ever to go to the NCAA Tournament. They'll be led by first-team All-American Daeshon Francis, a 6-4 senior guard who averaged 18.2 points and 6.6 rebounds last season. Other returning starters are 6-2 rebounder supreme Sammy Allen (6.9 ppg, 11.3 rpg), 6-7 Josh Morris (10.7, 5.1) and 6-1 James McPherson (14.5 ppg). Jevon Thomas, a 6-1 transfer who played at Seton Hall and Kansas State and started 25 games for the Wildcats, was a big addition at point guard.

CALIFORNIA BAPTIST: The Lancers (26-5) are pumped to make a long run in their last season in Division 2 before moving up a level to join the WAC. Coach Rick Croy has plenty of veterans on hand, plus one of the best newcomers in D2 this year in 6-8 Gabe Taylor, who averaged 11.6 points and 5.5 rebounds at Division 1 Portland last season. Starters returning are 6-9 Kalidou Diouf (15.8 ppg, 6.9 rpg), 6-5 Jason Todd and 6-2 Jordan Heading.

return 10 of their 11 players from an NCAA Tournament team, and are counting heavily on 6-10 All-American Zach Hankins (14.6 ppg, 10.5 rpg). His 3.9 blocked shots per game helped Ferris State lead the country in that category last season. Other starters back are 6-2 Drew Cushingberry (12.1 ppg, 3.6 apg), 6-3 Peter Firlik (10.8 ppg) and 6-4 Noah King. Division 1 transfer DeShaun Thrower, a 6-2 guard arriving at Ferris via Stony Brook, is the top recruit.

CHICO STATE: Coach Greg Clink's team (26-8) has grabbed two Elite Eight finishes over the last four years, and more is expected. The Wildcats return four starters: 6-8 Isaiah Ellis (13.3 ppg), 6-5 Corey Silverstrom (12.9), 5-10 Jalen McFerren and 6-9 Marvin Timothy.
